Randall began exhibiting his fine art photography in Galleries, Museums, and at outdoor Art Festivals in 1990. He has since won over forty awards, approximately half of which are Best-of-Show, Grand Prize, or First Place. His work hangs in private and corporate collections from Wisconsin to Florida, as well as Great Britain and Germany. Randall began teaching photography through seminars and workshops in 1993, a tradition which continues today at the Glynn Art Association. He is also primary instructor for the Photography Certificate Program at the Coastal Georgia Community College. An avid backpacker and outdoor adventurer long before he picked up a camera, it was only natural that Randall's interests centered on the beauty of nature and natural light. Randall formed Earth Art (eARTh) to celebrate and promote the art that is in the earth. He moved to Saint Simons Island in 1996 to expand the scope of his company to include photo safaris, teaching photography in locations like Cumberland Island, Sapelo Island, Jekyll Island, and the Okefenokee Swamp. This began a relationship with SouthEast Adventure Outfitters that continues to this day, with Randall leading kayaking trips into the natural beauty of this area. To Randall, successful fine art photography is about capturing emotion on paper. It is his belief that each and every one of us has a unique and personal vision; he has simply been able to polish the craft of the camera to a point that enables him to share his vision. He feels fortunate that enough people appreciate his vision that he has been accepted as an artist.
